Tribal Law

<u>Course description</u>: Review tribal, state and federal relationship, tribal sovereignty/inherent tribal power, federal and state power over Indian affairs, Trust Responsibility, land status and reality, civil and criminal jurisdiction and Indian treaties. This course includes a history of American Indian law and policy among the various tribal nations, the states, and the federal government. Finally this course will adhere to the university's commitment to providing a student-oriented learning environment based on the Dine' philosophy of education: Nitsahakees, Nahat'a, Iina'a, and sihasin.

<u>Learning Objectives and Assessments</u>: Upon successful completion of the course, the students will:

- Understand Federal Indian Law and Policy eras: 1. Treaty making 2. Reservation and Removal 3. Allotment 4. Indian Reorganization 5. Termination 6. Self Determination 7. Forced Federalism. **Measured by:** Assignments and final exams.
- Understand the impact of various changes in U.S. policy, Indian Reorganization Act (IRA) and its method of case briefing that consequently lead to Native Nation Sovereign expansion, maintenance, and diminishment. **Measured by:** Discussion and assignments.
- Gain understanding of inherent tribal powers and how that plays an essential role in federal and state regulation of Indian affairs and the ability of tribes to make their own laws and be governed by them. **Measured by:** Tests.
- Understand the Federal Indian Law method of case briefing. **Measured by:** Briefing cases through assignments.

Grading Policy

Each student must do their own work. Cheating and Plagiarism are strictly forbidden. Participation

Attendance Policy

Students are expected to regularly attend all classes for which they are registered. A percentage of the student's grade will be based on class attendance and participation. Furthermore, it is the student's responsibility to obtain notes, handouts, and any other information covered when absent from class and to arrange to make up any in-class assignments or tests if permitted by the instructor. Study Time Outside of Class for Face-to Face Courses

For every credit hour in class, a student is expected to spend two hours outside studying course materials.

Study Time for Hyrid or Blended Courses

For a hybrid or blended course of one credit hour, a student is expected to spend three hours per week studying course materials.

Study Time for Online Courses

For online course of one credit hour, a student is expected to spend four hours per week studying course materials.

Academic Integrity

Integrity (honesty) is expected of every student in all academic work. The guiding principle of academic integrity is that a student's submitted work must be the student's own. Students who engage in academic dishonesty diminish their education and bring discredit to the college community. Avoid situations likely to compromise academic integrity such as: cheating, facilitating academic dishonesty, and plagiarism; modifying academic work to obtain additional credit in the same class unless approved in advance by the instructor, failure to observe rules of academic integrity established by the instructor. The use of another person's ideas or work claimed as your own without acknowledging the original source is known as plagiarism and is prohibited.

The Diné Philosophy of Education (DPE) is incorporated into every class for students to become aware of and to understand the significance of the four Diné philosophical elements, including its affiliation with the four directions, four sacred mountains, the four set of thought processes and so forth: Nitsáhákees, Nahát'á, Íína and Siih Hasin which are essential and relevant to self-identity, respect and wisdom to achieve career goals successfully.
