Course Description:

This course provides the practical experience for nursing assistant students. Students will apply the nursing assistant skills learned in the nursing assistant theory and lab course in the care and comfort of individuals in various health care settings. This course is graded on a pass/fail basis.

Course Objectives:

- 1. Demonstrate safe, competent basic nursing care within the scope of practice of the nursing assistant.
- 2. Work cooperatively with other members of the health care team in the provision of basic nursing care.
- 3. Communicate effectively with patients/residents and other members of the health care team.
- 4. Demonstrate professional behavior.
- 5. Adhere to the policies and procedures of the facility and Navajo Technical University.

Grading Plan: The student must achieve a "pass" to be eligible to take the state certification examination. This course is graded on participation and accuracy in the performance of nursing assistant skills. The participation portion includes accurate performance of the skills, proper attire, no facial piercing, no visible, tattoos, no neck ecchymosis. It also includes bringing the required work tools and interactions with peers, patients, coworkers, and staff. The student must demonstrate professional behavior and comply with NTU and facility policies.

Course Policies: A student will be directed to leave the clinical area if any of the policies are not followed.

Cell Phones: Cell phones may not be brought to the clinical site. No electronic devices may be brought to the clinical site. Cell phones and electronic devices are not to be used during patient care.

Attendance Policy: The student MUST attend the first assigned day of clinical. A student who misses the first day will not be allowed to continue in the course and will be dropped. Attendance includes being on-time and in proper uniform. A student will be directed to leave the clinical area if not on time and in proper uniform and will be given an absence for the day. IN ORDER TO PASS THE COURSE, THE STUDENT MUST COMPLETE 40 HOURS OF CLINICAL EXPERIENCE. THIS IS MANDATED BY STATE RULES AND REGULATIONS.

It is the <u>student's</u> responsibility to arrange for transportation to the clinical area. The days and times will be given at least two weeks prior to the beginning of the clinical experience. The student may bring a lunch from home or in some facilities arrangements for meals may be made. Lunch breaks are not long enough to allow the student to leave the facility.

Academic Integrity: Integrity (honesty) is expected of every student in all academic work. The guiding principle of academic integrity is that a student's submitted work must be the student's own. Students who engage in academic dishonesty diminish their education and bring discredit to the college community. Avoid situations likely to compromise academic integrity such as: cheating, facilitating
